

Celebrate 200 Years of Norwegian Immigration to the US at ASHM! Across the Atlantic: Sloopers and the First Organized Emigration from Norway to America May 22, 2025 – October 19, 2025



Philadelphia, PA- 200 years ago, a group of Norwegian immigrants made the trek across the ocean to start a new life in the United States. This May, discover the story of this 1825 voyage when Across the Atlantic: Sloopers and the First Organized Emigration from Norway to America opens at the American Swedish Historical Museum.

The Sloopers of Stavanger, a group of fifty-two Quaker Norwegian emigrants named for the single-masted sailboat, or sloop, they traveled in, were the first large group to come to settle in North America from Norway. Traveling aboard a small sloop called the *Restauration*, the 1825 voyage took a lengthy 98 days and tested the

resolve of its passengers and crew. Their arrival began a wave of Norwegian migration to America that lasted into the next century. *Across the Atlantic* delves into the Sloopers' motivations for leaving Norway, their experiences on the open sea, and their eventual arrival and settlement in the United States.

This balcony exhibit will be on view at ASHM from May 22, 2025 through October 19, 2025. Admission is included with ASHM general tickets. ASHM is open Tuesday through Friday 10:00 am – 4:00 pm and weekends 12:00 - 4:00 pm.

The exhibit highlights the Sloopers' experiences on the open sea and their eventual arrival in the United States.

Visit the American Swedish Historical Museum to learn the forgotten history of Swedes in Philadelphia. Built in 1926 during the Sesquicentennial, the Museum has a unique interior divided into a dozen galleries designed to highlight Scandinavian influences in America. The galleries explore a range of topics including the New Sweden Colony, women's history, scientific innovations, and Swedish craft arts. ASHM hosts a variety of programs from Swedish holiday celebrations to history lectures to family programs.
